How Does Asset Mapping Work?

Community members or organizers act as "community actionists," identifying the resources present in their neighborhood. This process can involve community exploration, online research, and surveys to map out the community's strengths.

Goals of Asset Mapping:

The primary goal is to understand the existing resources, relationships, and structures within a community. By recognizing these strengths, communities can leverage them to address challenges and drive positive change.

Forms of Asset Maps:

Asset maps can take various forms, including:

- A comprehensive list of influential individuals, associations, and institutions within the community.
- A physical map showcasing community resources.
- A digital database containing information on institutions, resources, and community contacts.

Why Use Asset Mapping?

Unlike traditional community development methods that focus on deficiencies or needs, asset mapping emphasizes what the community already has. It operates on the principle that many solutions to community challenges already exist within the community itself, waiting to be harnessed.

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Step-by-Step Process and Checklist for Mapping Community Resources
